FOUNDATIONAL TRENDS

More cities having charter amendment elections

Many charters have not been amended in over 30 years

Most charters have inconsistent, contradictory and vague provisions

Cities regularly have charter provisions they just ignore

Leaving Articles, Sections, sentences, and words on the cutting room floor

Unnecessary Language

Duplicative Language – not the same as Unnecessary Language

Do not surprise your council members

Use it to educate media and public

Seek to simplify, not impress

WHAT DOES THE COMMITTEE DO?

Meets with city staff and attorney(s)
Studies possible amendments, proposed and otherwise

Make recommendations to city council
Help educate citizens on proposed amendments

GETTING STARTED

Committee members should be called with invitation to participate

Initial letter outlining charge (if any), duties, timeline through election day and general explanation of duties

Provide copy of current city charter

Provide resources

Post meetings as public meeting and invite media

Push for smaller government

Voter distrust of government

Vocal group(s) of unhappy citizens

THE FIRST MEETING

High level view of local government Give history of city charter and amendments Elect Chair and Vice Chair Set meeting parameters Vote necessary to recommend amendments Reconsideration of previously approved amendments Length of meetings Citizen Participation Set process for review Set regular meeting schedule

WHAT IS THE CITY COUNCIL DOING?

Consider recommending they not attend committee meetings

Provide an update in open session at each council meeting

Understand concerns and wants of your council

Make sure council is not surprised

Change in base number for initiative, referendum and recall

Increased requirements for petition signatures

SELLING THE AMENDMENTS

Requires work with media to get firm reporting Council must be supportive of election Council, administration and committee members must be out selling Must be prepared on talking points HOA's, civic organizations, church groups other locally influential groups Public Hearings

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
