NOTICE OF VIOLATION

- Chapter 54 civil penalty requires prior notice
- Effective jury argument requires the same thing
- A chance to comply

THE LAWSUIT - REMEDIES

- Chapter 54
 - Civil Penalties (\$1,000 per day)
 - Injunctive Relief (harm to health or the property of another)

THE LAWSUIT - REMEDIES

- Chapter 211
 - Civil Penalties (if in ordinance)
 - Injunctive Relief (no discretion?)

SETTLEMENT

 Key question – how can you compromise to allow violations to continue?

SETTLEMENT

- •Areas of compromise:
 - Amount of penalty
 - Time to comply
 - Specific requirements to comply
 - Enforcement realities


DISCOVERY

- Deposition
- Interrogatories
- Request for Production
 - Documentation of business operations

DISCOVERY

- Inspection
 - •Rule 196.7
 - A picture is worth a thousand words
 - A video may be worth a million





INTERIM RELIEF

- Temporary Injunction
 - Stop a violation from occurring
 - Interrupt a violative process
 - Permanently abate a violation

INTERIM RELIEF

- Temporary Injunction
 - Quick trial as solution

TRIAL

- Publicity
- Sympathy
- •Improper defenses
 - •Laches
 - Waiver

JUDGMENT

- Civil Penalties
- Permanent Injunction
 - Specific enough to clearly follow
 - Specific enough to clearly enforce
 - General enough to prevent evasion
 - Entry onto land

ENFORCEMENT

- An injunction ain't nothin' but a piece of paper
- Maximum penalties
 - •\$500 fine
 - •6 months in jail
- •Jail makes it a criminal case
- Coercive contempt is civil

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
